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GETTING READY TO READ

Kids who read Braille need strength in their arms, fingers and hands in order to push the Braille writer keys or punch paper with a stylus. They also need to be ready to take in the tactile sensations of dots on paper. Fortunately it's easy to build strength, hand coordination and tactile readiness through play. Here are some activities that will help build strong Braille readers.

FOR ARM AND HAND STRENGTH:

The human wheelbarrow—hold the child's feet while they walk on their hands.

Fill pails with sand, lift and pour.

Climb on play equipment at the park.

Push and pull toys.

FOR HAND AND FINGER STRENGTH:

Squeeze water out of sponges.

Attach clothes pins to the edge of a box.

Open jars with lids

Play with pull-apart toys such as pop beads, Legos[®], and magnets.

Pull the trigger on a squirt gun or spray bottle.

Mold and pinch play dough.

Pull up a zipper.

FOR FINGER SENSITIVITY:

Find toys with interesting textures and sort...smooth, fuzzy, bumpy, etc.

Bath time: Talk about the feel of the soap, the washcloth, and the lather of shampoo.

Finger paint with shaving cream.

Serve finger foods with different textures such as cracker pieces, soft bread, spaghetti, cereal.



ACCESSIBLE COMPUTER GAME: "THREE-D VELOCITY"

Three-D Velocity is a combat flight simulation game designed with blind gamers in mind. The player is in complete control of the simulated aircraft, from take off to landing on an aircraft carrier. The pilot can engage in aerial dog fights with other aircraft or play in "Mission Mode" where the pilot carries out an assigned combat mission. Unlike standard video games where information is conveyed through graphics, Three-D Velocity uses directional sound. "If you've ever wanted to fly at mach two, shoot down other aircraft, make split-second decisions to save your own life, and play the lead role in the outcome of a mission started by United States black operation forces, Three-D Velocity is definitely for you."
