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NFB CONVENTION: A GREAT OPPORTUNITY FOR PARENTS IS COMING UP!

The National Organization of Parents of Blind Children Seminar Day for parents is around the corner. Numerous educational sessions for parents of blind/visually impaired kids will be held on Tuesday, July 1, 2014 as part of National Federation of the Blind Convention in Orlando, Florida. 
TEACHING TOUCH

As they progress through school, blind/visually impaired children will be required to make sense of raised line drawings, maps, graphs, scientific illustrations and other tactile graphic representations. Just as learning to distinguish the patterns of Braille dots in letters requires practice, so does the ability to make sense of tactile pictures. The American Printing House for

the Blind offers a teaching tool for developing the skills for tactile learning. Here is what APH says:

"[Teaching Touch Kit](#) by Lois Harrell helps parents or teachers encourage young children (ages 4 to 7 years) who are blind to become active explorers and readers of tactile graphics. Teaching Touch is written in a style that is accessible to parents and non-professionals to show how learning through touch is different from learning through sight. It emphasizes the need for concept development that's based on a rich background of hands-on exploration of the environment. Various skills that contribute to exploration and appreciation of tactile graphics are addressed in the included booklet. These include tracking, searching, verbal description, and the use of symbols. There are 16 tactile worksheets included with this kit. They range from very simple shape tracing and line tracking activities to more complex activities that require the ability to locate a tactile symbol within an array of different symbols and textures. The tactile graphics provided use three different production methods on three types of paper to allow exposure to a variety of graphics."

Blind high school senior, Aaron Golub, from Massachusetts will be playing on the Tulane University football team in the fall.
